MISSION STATEMENT

The primary mission of the Atwater City Fire Department is to provide a range of services and programs aimed towards protecting the lives and property of the citizens of Atwater City and the surrounding communities from the adverse effects of fires, medical emergencies, exposure to hazardous materials, and or other dangerous conditions as an all risk emergency response department.

These programs include comprehensive fire protection planning, fire suppression, emergency medical response, rescue, hazardous materials response, fire prevention and education, as well as fire code enforcement. The Atwater City Fire Department also provides mutual and automatic aid to neighboring agencies while being part of the statewide fire rescue mutual aid system.

POLICY

1

Provide efficient levels of fire protection services to the citizens of Atwater. Encourage the continuance of the existing contractual arrangement between the City of Atwater and the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection for cooperative fire protection services.

2

Continue to bring forward recommendations for the Department's facilities, personnel, and technology as required to meet the changing conditions and increased demands for services.

3

Maintain and manage fire impact fees in order to provide a supplemental source of funding for capital equipment. This will allow the Atwater Fire Department to expand fire protection service into areas of significant new growth as the need arises and keep equipment up to date to meet the ever changing all risk emergency response environment.

4

Seek opportunities, where feasible, to conduct joint operations, share responsibilities, or construct joint facilities with municipalities in order to avoid duplication of effort or cost in the provision of basic fire protection services. Pursue meaningful automatic and mutual aid agreements with other adjoining fire entities.

5

Continue to update the Atwater Fire Department's Master Plan with guidance from the Atwater City Council and members of City Staff.

6

Pursue grant funding through local, State and Federal agencies to obtain needed support for various programs.

2023 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Improved staffing levels. Added 2 Captains, 6 Firefighters and 1 Office Technician. This gives us 3 person staffing at both stations 24/7.
- Purchased and started the build process on a Type VI Fire Engine.
- Purchased and up-fitted two new Command Vehicles.
- Successful in \$252,685 grant for new Self Contained Breathing Apparatus and cascade fill station through a regional grant with Merced City Fire.
- Initiated Public Safety Master Plan.
- Continued to improve inter-agency relations through grants and training.
- Continued to expand and progress in our annual ladder truck academy and various other specialized trainings.
- Re-implemented Firefighter of the Year Award.
- Continued with heavy involvement in public education.

- Improve firefighter health and wellness
- Prepare for expansion and future of a third fire station in the City including incremental increases of staffing as years progress.
- Progress on Station 41 remodel.
- Advancement of our Equipment Replacement Plan.
- Completion of Public Safety Master Plan.
- Continue to improve and foster interagency relations.

Operations

Bobby Ayuso was appointed as the Atwater City Fire Battalion Chief in January 2021. Chief Ayuso is the 6th Battalion Chief since Atwater City came into agreement with CAL FIRE in 2008. Under the direction of Fire Chief Mike van Loben Sels and Assistant Chief Mark Pimentel, Chief Ayuso oversees the operations of the Atwater Fire Department. Bobby oversees two Fire Stations which includes a fleet of 4 fire apparatus, 18 professional firefighters and 3 reserve Firefighters. Battalion 14 is responsible for protecting sections of State Highway 99, as well as two major railways (Union Pacific and Santa Fe Railroad).



Outside of City operations, Chief Ayuso is the lead for the Madera-Mariposa-Merced Unit scheduling program and handles all Battalion Chief scheduling. He's also responsible for a variety of programs which are outsourced to certain personnel within his Battalion including the unit wide ladder truck program, social media, high school Every 15 minutes programs, training, pre-plans, Insurance Services Office (ISO) reviews, ladder testing and much more.

Bobby has worked in Atwater City for nine years and prior to that, he worked in several surrounding Merced County stations. He's a local resident and his close connections to the community are evident in the relationships he's developed in the City of Atwater. He considers himself fortunate to serve the Atwater community.

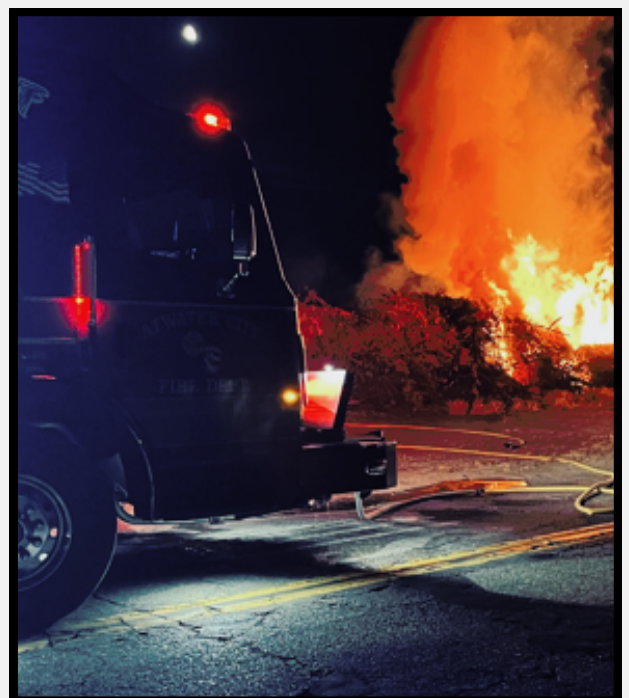

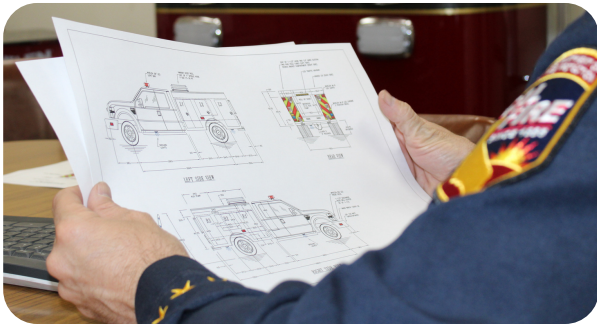

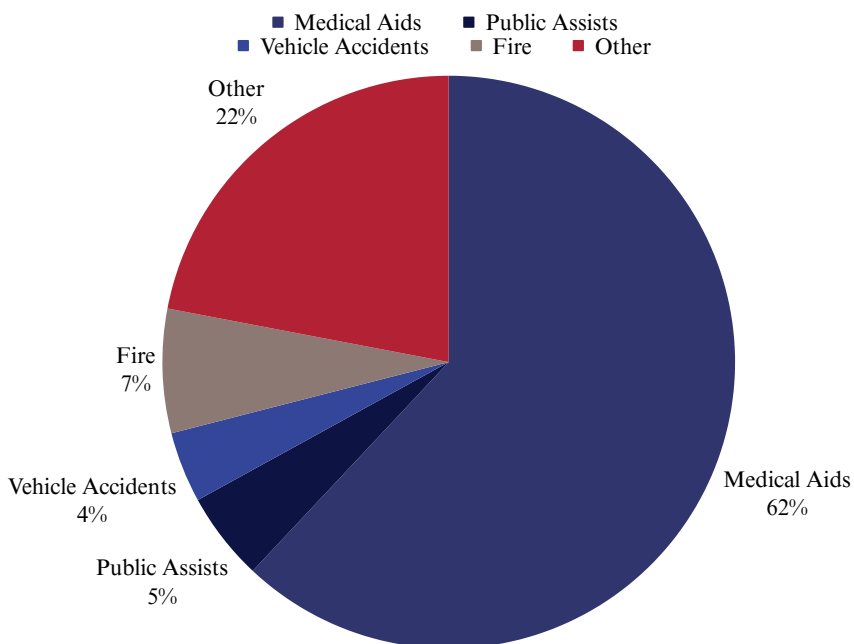

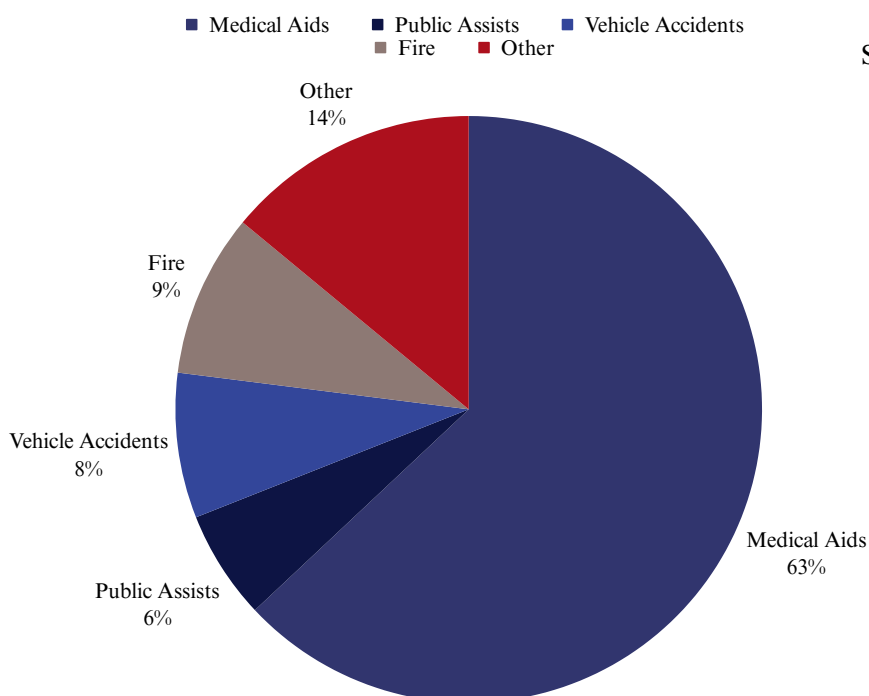

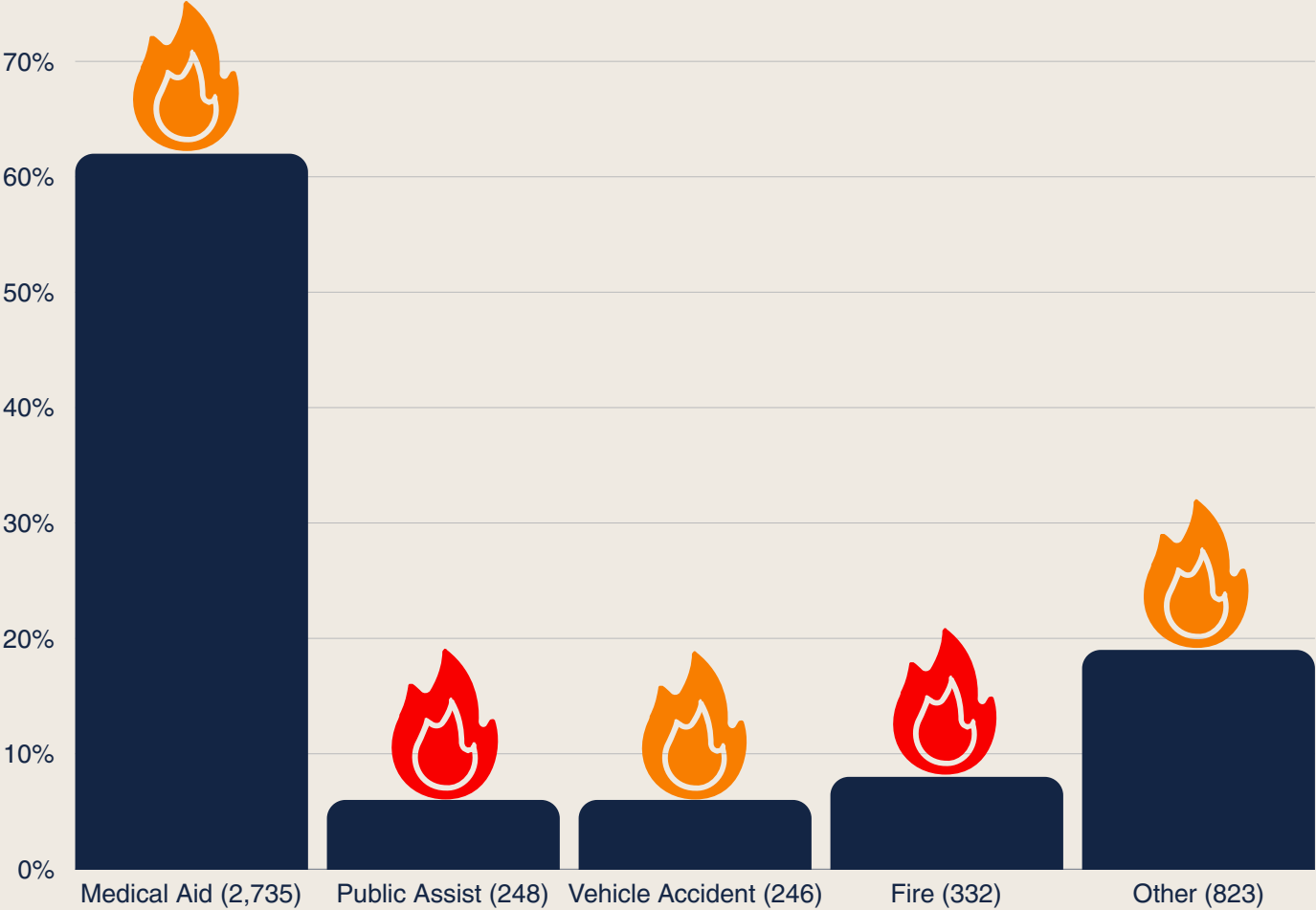
